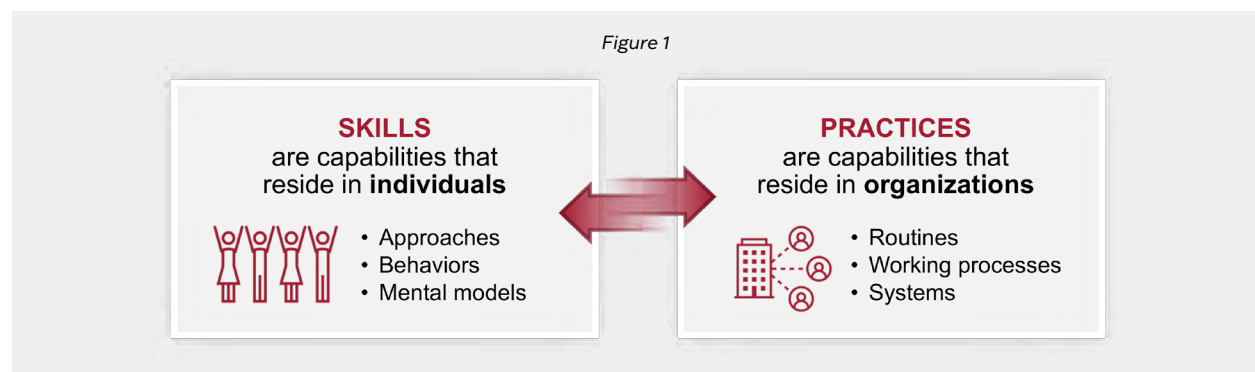

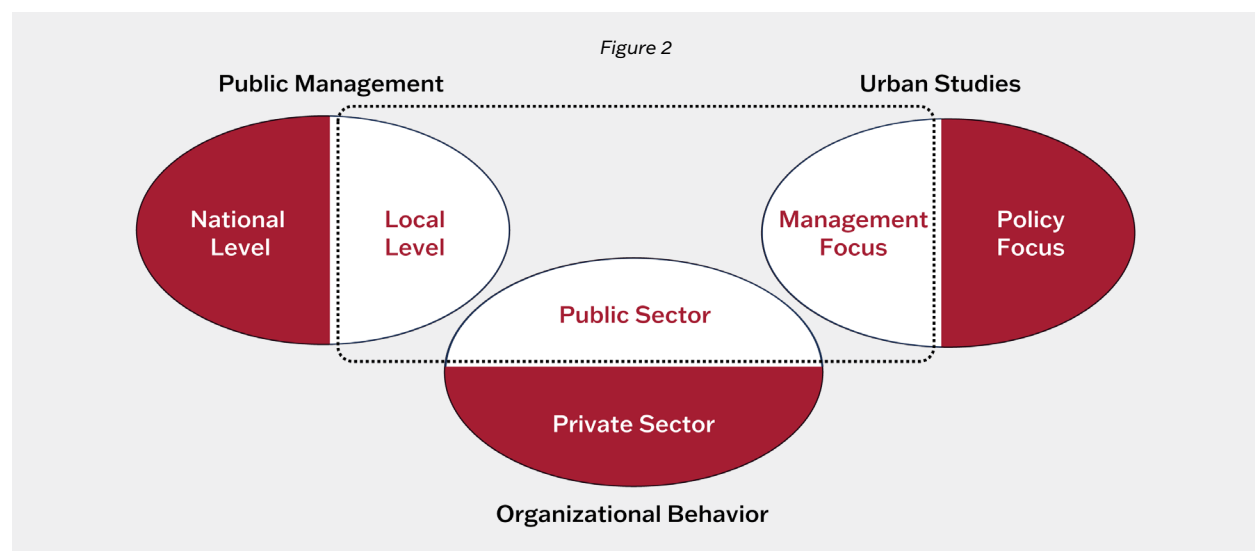
Capabilities for Problem-oriented Governance in Cities

The Bloomberg Harvard City Leadership Initiative—located at the Bloomberg Center for Cities at Harvard University—is a collaboration between Harvard Kennedy School, Harvard Business School, and Bloomberg Philanthropies. Its mission is to equip current and future city leaders with the insights and tools to tackle social issues and to advance the field of study. More than 40 faculty have contributed to research and curriculum development to date, with the support of almost 60 Initiative-affiliated student research assistants and research fellows. The Initiative's research, teaching, and applied work focus on *capabilities* for problem-oriented governance in cities. These include organizational practices as well as managerial and leadership skills (Figure 1).



The subject of capabilities is vastly understudied. Most public management and leadership research focuses on national-level government, not on local government. Most research on cities focuses on urban policy and planning, not on management and leadership. And most organizational behavior research focuses on the private sector, not on the public sector.

The Initiative has concentrated on systematically filling this triple knowledge gap (Figure 2). Its research program has studied the capabilities that city leaders (mayors and other city officials as well as non-profit leaders and social entrepreneurs) need to tackle complex social issues. This includes collaborating across sectors, jurisdictions, and organizational silos; using data and evidence to make decisions; developing and implementing innovations; and leading and managing strategically.



Research Questions and Output

The Initiative's research questions are informed by direct interaction with city leaders in fieldwork and executive education programs: What levers can local leaders use to better diagnose and remedy urban problems? Under what conditions can collaborating across sectoral, organizational, and departmental boundaries, using data and evidence, and focusing on innovation lead to better outcomes for city residents? What organizational and institutional challenges make it difficult to tackle urban problems holistically? To answer these questions, the Initiative has drawn on the expertise of quantitative and qualitative researchers from a variety of disciplines across Harvard. To date, 22 papers have been published in high-impact peer-reviewed journals, including *Administration & Society*, *Cities*, *Global Policy*, the *Journal of Applied Behavioral Science*, *Perspectives on Public Management and Governance*, the *Journal of Public Administration Research and Theory*, *Public Management Review*, *Population Health*, *PLOS ONE*, and *Review of Public Personnel Administration*. Another five papers are currently under review.

Appendices A and B provide a list of published and ongoing research for the period 2019-2024, organized by date, capability, and type of publication, including links to papers and other materials.

Initiative faculty and staff are working on two major book projects. The first, *Leading Cities Today: Leveraging People, Data, and Ideas*, weaves together core elements of the Initiative's research and curriculum portfolios. The second, *Teaming Up to Tackle Public Problems: Strategies and Tactics for Joint Problem-Solving*, presents research and case studies on collaborative problem-solving and innovation.

Convenings and Dissemination

The Initiative will play a key role in launching a bi-annual international research conference of the Bloomberg Center for Cities at Harvard University, starting in 2025/2026, focused on the management, leadership, and governance of cities. The conference aims to bring diverse scholars from multiple disciplines together around this topic and advance the field of study.

To bring research findings back to the people and places where the research questions originated, and to disseminate learnings broadly to those who can leverage them in their work, we have produced practitioner-oriented articles. These Action Insights make the findings and insights from our academic research accessible to practitioners and students. Appendix C provides a list (with links) of the Initiative's practitioner-oriented publications.



Alongside faculty members, dozens of staff members, including this group convened in 2022, have contributed to research and curriculum work since 2019.

Curriculum Development

To date, the team has produced more than three dozen teaching cases designed to teach the research findings. These cases feature diverse city leaders as protagonists: more than two thirds are either women, people of color, or leaders of cities outside of the United States. To support the effective use and interpretation of these cases, the Initiative develops accompanying educator and practitioner guides for faculty and facilitators interested in teaching the material. The Initiative also produces multimedia toolkits that bundle cases, worksheets, and video to facilitate training and instruction centered around key elements of the research and curriculum. Finally, interactive asynchronous digital learning modules are designed for use in degree programs and executive education, empowering learners to engage with teaching cases and conceptual frameworks on their own, without instructors.

The purpose-built, research-based curricular materials serve as the foundation for the Initiative's executive education programs, which as of spring 2025 have trained 583 mayors and 3,056 senior city officials in 575 cities worldwide. Responsive both to the long-term and changing needs of city leaders, the Initiative develops curriculum not only for its yearlong mayors and senior leaders program but also for a set of supplemental programs centered around core leadership challenges, including procurement, negotiation, talent management, civic engagement, and economic development.
